## A Lady of Many Talents Lois Cardinal -



TGN: Lois, tell us about your new position as liason for Building D at Menlo Commons.

Lois: I am supposed to filter concerns of residents in my building and bring them to the Board of Directors - perhaps from residents who don't feel comfortable expressing their concerns directly to the Board. I have just begun and have had a couple of concerns expressed to me so far. This is supposed to be on the monthly agenda of the meeting with one of the liasons making a presentation at each meeting. I am on for the April meeting.

TGN: When did you move in to Menlo Commons?

Lois: It was seven years ago. I like the quiet location I have at Building D. I remodeled the unit, putting in wooden floors and fixed up the kitchen.

TGN: Tell us about work education and occupation background. Lois: I was graduated from William Paterson University in New Jersey, and later obtained my masters degree at age 50 form National University in Irvine, California. I have taught developmentally disabled and brain injured children, ages 10-18 in special education, first in Southern California, and then at Juvenile Hall in San Francisco where I worked with high risk youths. I taught math and language arts subjects. Although I retired 6 years ago, I continue to tutor two students now.

TGN: You served on Menlo Commons Board of Directors too? Lois: Yes, until about a year and a half ago. During my six years as a director we did the elevator project and started the roof project. The experience gave me a better idea of what is going on here, although it involved the disadvantage of stress.

TGN: Tell us about your family.

Lois: I have two children and 4 granddaughters, My son David was graduated from Princeton University and has a variety of skills. He gives speeches and consults on digital and high technology, and takes and exhibits photographs of wild life from locations around the world. My daughter Suzette was graduated from Duke University,

and is a psychologist. She advises corporate lawyers on jury selection. Now, with her family, she has become a homemaker. Three of my granddaughters are in college. They are studying engineering, chemistry and neuroscience at Princeton, Wesleyan, and Northeastern Universities. The fourth one graduated last year from the University of Maryland, and she works in computer science,

TGN: Lois, what activities do you enjoy now?

Lois: I've traveled extensively. Last year I went to South Africa for a safari in Botswana with my son. He also took me to southeast Asia a few years ago - to Burma, Cambodia and Thailand. Two years ago I took two of my granddaughters to Costa Rica. We did the zip-line over the rainforest, which was a longtime wish. I've been around the world over the years - to other countries in Europe, Asia, Africa and Central America. I enjoy traveling, but I also enjoy coming home. It makes you appreciate all that we have here. More people should do it. I am also into painting art (one of my pictures is hanging inside the door to the first floor of Building D), play golf, participate three times a week in the swimming pool exercise group here, and play bridge. I'm active in Stanford Singles, belong to a weekly discussion group, and the Portola Valley Investment Club which is a group of 12 men and women with an interest in investing. I spend more time researching investments on my own, than on any other hobbies.

TGN: Tell us more about your investment group.

Lois: We don't have any professional financial counselor present in the group, although the other members may have their own outside advisors. We discuss investments, such as stock equities and others of interest. I read the Wall Street Journal. And we have our own investment portfolio. We invest together and see how we can improve our skills.
