At this point we thought we were done, but the Lord had other plans for us. Taryn, our surprise baby, was born in 1986. This summer our two daughters will be married, Shelby in New York City on June 21, and Taryn in Oregon on August 23.

TGN: Duane, describe your career.

Duane: I graduated from Stanford University in 1965 with a degree in Political Science, and then went to Hastings College of Law. I started with a firm in Redwood City and then after 10 years formed my own firm in Palo Alto. I worked for this firm for 25 years and it still is in existence. The areas I worked in were insurance defense and personal injury, doing about 50-50 of each.
